Resolution Number 133-2013: A Resolution to Support the Ballot Question to Raise the Minimum Wage.

## City of Lambertville RESOLUTION NUMBER 133-2013 Support Ballot Question #2 to Raise New Jersey's Minimum Wage

**WHEREAS**, the federal minimum wage was signed into law in 1938 by President Franklin Roosevelt, at the height of the Great Depression; and

**WHEREAS**, the minimum wage increases consumer purchasing power, increases workers' standards of living, reduces poverty, and stimulates the economy; and

**WHEREAS**, the cost of living in New Jersey continues to rise, yet there has been no state legislative action approved to increase in the minimum wage since 2005; and

**WHEREAS**, unlike New Jersey, 19 other states and the District of Columbia currently maintain a minimum wage above the federal rate of \$7.25; and

**WHEREAS,** 10 states provide for the annual adjustment of their minimum wage to ensure that

the real value of the lowest paid workers' wages does not shrink as normal costs of living goes

up, 4 states have amended their constitutions to do so; and

**WHEREAS**, according to New Jersey Policy Perspective, 429,000 workers in New Jersey earn at or near the minimum wage, more than 350,000 are over the age of 20, 250,000 are women, 79,000 are men, 154,000 are Hispanic, 69,000 are Black and 31,000 are Asian; and

**WHEREAS**, because Governor Chris Christie vetoed a minimum wage increase this year, the state legislature voted to place the question before voters on the November 5, 2013 ballot to raise the minimum wage and adjust it annually according to the consumer price index; and

WHEREAS, by raising the standard of living through a higher minimum wage, New Jersey would likely realize various societal benefits such as improved education, safer communities, greater opportunity for upward mobility, and more financial stability for families; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Federal Reserve Bank conducted a study in 2011 that estimates that for every dollar increase in the minimum wage, there is \$2,800 in new consumer spending by that household the following year, this revenue is injected into the local economy which translates into greater consumer demand for local goods and services, thereby requiring employers to hire additional workers to meet this demand which translates into job creation; and

**BE IT RESOLVED,** that we, the governing body of XX urge the residents of our community to support Ballot Question #2 to Raise New Jersey's minimum wage from \$7.25 to \$8.25 an hour and adjust annually based on the Consumer Price Index to reflect the economic conditions facing New Jersey workers and to ensure that New Jersey's minimum wage is not a poverty wage but is a fair wage for workers.

A Resolution of Support for the Referendum to Regionalize the School District K-12

#### RESOLUTION

**WHEREAS,** the South Hunterdon Regional High School District ('South Hunterdon'') educates students in grades 7-12 from the City of Lambertville ("Lambertville"), the Borough of Stockton ("Stockton") and the Township of West Amwell ("West Amwell"); and

**WHEREAS**, the Lambertville Public School educates students in grades PK-6 from the City of Lambertville; and

**WHEREAS,** in an effort to explore appropriate cost-effective alternatives for educating the students from the three communities, a feasibility study was performed for the purpose of analyzing several alternative reconfigurations of the various school districts; and

WHEREAS, in February 2012, the feasibility study was completed, wherein it was concluded that, if South Hunterdon Regional High School were dissolved, a new PK-12 regional district could be formed with Lambertville, Stockton, and West Amwell that would provide each community with educational benefits over the current educational system with the best potential for each of the three communities to share in financial savings; and

**WHEREAS**, in April 2012, the boards of education and municipal governing bodies of each community as well as the South Hunterdon Board requested that the Executive County Superintendent conduct an investigation into the dissolution of South Hunterdon Regional High School and the creation of a PK-12 regional school district, and issue an advisability report as required by *N.J.S.A.* 18A:13-52; and

**WHEREAS**, in May 2012, the Executive County Superintendent completed his investigation and released his advisability report, which report supported the recommendation contained in the feasibility study that the communities of Lambertville, Stockton, and West

Amwell dissolve South Hunterdon Regional High School and join to create a PK-12 regional school district; and

**WHEREAS**, in September 2012, the Commissioner of Education, serving as Chairperson of the Board of Review, granted authorization to conduct a referendum on the dissolution of South Hunterdon Regional High School and, shortly thereafter, the Executive County Superintendent established September 24, 2013 as the date for the holding of the aforementioned referendum on dissolution; and

WHEREAS, in May 2013, the boards of education and municipal governing bodies of each community as well as the South Hunterdon Board, authorized and called for the holding of a special school election to take place on September 24, 2013, wherein two referendum questions shall be placed before the voters of Stockton, Lambertville, and West Amwell, first authorizing the dissolution of South Hunterdon Regional High School and second, authorizing the creation of a new PK-12 regional school district that will replace the four school districts currently serving the communities of Stockton, Lambertville, and West Amwell; and

**WHEREAS**, based on the favorable conclusions from the feasibility study and the subsequent analysis and work of the ad hoc Regionalization Committee, the Township Committee anticipates educational benefits and potential financial benefits for West Amwell; and

**WHEREAS** Mayor and Council acknowledges the desire and endorsement at both the state and county levels to regionalize small school districts such as ours; and

**WHEREAS**, the Mayor and Council anticipates short term tax savings to City of Lambertville homeowners through regionalization as compared to the current configuration due to the consolidated tax levy apportionment; and

**WHEREAS**, the Mayor and Council anticipates long term tax savings to City of Lambertville homeowners through regionalization as compared to the current configuration, as it will enable more flexibility for reconfigurations and balancing of resources across all schools; and

**WHEREAS**, the Mayor and Council anticipates the benefits of regionalization will ultimately help to contain the rising cost to educate City of Lambertville students as well as enhance student performance, opportunities and experience while attending elementary, middle and high school.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Mayor and Council supports and endorses the dissolution of South Hunterdon Regional High School and the subsequent creation of a new PK-12 regional school district to serve the students of Lambertville, West Amwell and Stockton.

**FURTHERMORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the City of Lambertville encourages voters to consider supporting regionalization by voting Yes to both referendum questions on Sept 24<sup>th</sup> 2013.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 7, Traffic, Section 4.5

**7-4.5 Parking Time Limited on Certain Streets.** No person shall park a vehicle for longer than the time limit shown, at any time between the hours listed of any day upon any of the streets or parts of the streets described below.

This subsection shall not apply to Police, firefighting or rescue squad vehicles in the performance of their duties.

NOTE: This ordinance extends the meters to Swan Street on South Union Street, adding a new block beginning at Ferry Street and ending at Swan Street.

This ordinance is subject to the State of New Jersey, Department of Transportation's approval and installation of the mid-block crosswalk on Bridge Street to permit pedestrian traffic across the D&R Canal Commission's Tow Path, block 1035, lot 10, known on the Tax Maps of the City of Lambertville as the Delaware and Raritan Canal Feeder, owned by the State of New Jersey.

Mayor DelVecchio opened the public hearing on Ordinance Number 18-2013 and asked for public comments. Mayor DelVecchio asked the Police Director approximately how many spaces this would provide for and Police Director Cocuzza commented 10-12 spaces. Caren Franzini of South Union Street asked where they would be ending. Mayor DelVecchio responded that it would end in front of the Justice Center.

Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to close the public hearing on Ordinance Number 18-2013. Councilwoman Asaro made a motion to close the public hearing on Ordinance Number 18-2013. Councilman Sanders seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to adopt on second reading and final approval, Ordinance Number 18-2013. Councilman Sanders made a motion to adopt Ordinance Number 18-2013 on second reading and final approval. Councilwoman Asaro seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

Ordinance Number 19-2013: An Ordinance of the City of Lambertville, County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey, Authorizing the Establishment of a Government Energy Aggregation Program.

Mayor DelVecchio read the Ordinance into the record by title. He informed the members of the public present that Government Energy Aggregation is the result of the deregulation of the utility in New Jersey and he then introduced Kenny Esser of Gable Associates, the consultant to the SHREC for Community Aggregation. Mr. Esser commented that this will allow the community to do third party purchasing of electric services through the South Hunterdon Renewable Energy Cooperative with West Amwell Township. There was a public meeting held on September 10<sup>th</sup> with approximately 30 people present and no one was in opposition.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 19-2013**

#### AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAMBERTVILLE, COUNTY OF HUNTERDON, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A GOVERNMENT ENERGY AGGREGATION PROGRAM

**WHEREAS,** the Government Energy Aggregation Act,  $\underline{\text{N.J.S.A.}}$  48:3-93.1 *et seq.* governs the establishment of a government energy aggregation program, which is a government-operated purchasing cooperative through which multiple energy consumers purchase energy together under the auspices of a government aggregator; and

**WHEREAS,** the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities ("BPU") has promulgated rules (N.J.A.C. 14:4-6) for the implementation of government energy aggregation programs; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to the Government Energy Aggregation Act, N.J.S.A. 48:3-93.1 *et seq.*, the City of Lambertville seeks to establish a Government Energy Aggregation Program ("Program") for the provision of electricity within the City, for the purpose of obtaining power supply cost savings for residential and business participants in the City; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lambertville intends to serve as the Lead Agency of the Government Energy Aggregation Program in the City of Lambertville and, in that capacity and consistent with applicable rules, to solicit proposals and enter into a contract for the provision of electric generation services on behalf of residential and business customers within the boundaries of the City, to the extent that such a contract will produce power supply cost savings to residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lambertville will implement the Government Energy Aggregation Program through the South Hunterdon Regional Energy Cooperative("SHREC"), and will serve as the Lead Agency of the SHREC for this purpose and, as Lead Agency, will solicit proposals and enter into a contract for the provision of electric generation services on behalf of residential and business customers within the boundaries of surrounding municipalities which have passed an ordinance to form a Government Energy Aggregation Program and to participate in the SHREC for that purpose, to the extent that such a contract will produce power supply cost savings for those residents and businesses; and

**WHEREAS,** the City of Lambertville will from time to time during the Effective Period as defined below solicit proposals from electric power suppliers for electric generation services through the Program in which the City of Lambertville will act as Lead Agency of the South Hunterdon Regional Energy Cooperative ("SHREC"); and

WHEREAS, the City of Lambertville will from time to time during the Effective Period as defined below issue one or more Request for Proposals for electric generation services and energy aggregation services on behalf of the SHREC pursuant to the Local Public Contract Law Regulations, the Government Energy Aggregation Act and the Electric Discount and Energy Competition Act; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Lambertville will only award contracts for said electric generation service and energy aggregation services to electric power suppliers that are deemed qualified and that submit price bids lower than the prevailing price for utility-provided basic generation service;

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to applicable BPU rules, the City needs to enter into an Electric Distribution Company Aggregation Agreement with Jersey Central Power and Light Company ("JCP&L"); and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 48:3-93.1 et seq. requires the Program to be established by ordinance.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the governing body of the City of Lambertville, County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey as follows:

**SECTION 1.** The City hereby establishes a Government Energy Aggregation Program, in accordance with the provisions of the Government Energy Aggregation Act, N.J.S.A. 48:3-93.1 *et seq.* 

**SECTION 2.** The Mayor is authorized to execute and the Clerk to attest to the execution of and Electric Distribution Aggregation Agreement, in a form acceptable to the City, with Jersey Central Power and Light Company ("JCP&L").

**SECTION 3.** The City of Lambertville will act as Lead Agency of the SHREC and, in that capacity, and consistent with applicable rules, will solicit proposals for electric generation service and energy aggregation services on behalf of City residents and businesses, as well as the residents and businesses of any surrounding municipalities that pass an ordinance to form a Government Energy Aggregation Program and to participate in the SHREC for that purpose, and enter into a contract for such services provided that the lowest qualified bid price is below the prevailing price for utility-provided basic generation service.

**SECTION 4.** As Lead Agency the City of Lambertville will execute a master performance agreement that obligates the participants in the SHREC to purchase electricity at terms and conditions stated therein with a third party supplier who has been awarded the contract by the Lead Agency on behalf of participating members of the SHREC, and provided that such contract shall be at prices reasonably forecast and estimated by the City of Lambertville to provide savings to participants relative to the price charged for basic generation service by JCP&L.

**SECTION 5.** The authorization provided herein shall be valid until September 30, 2015, at which time the Program will be subject to renewal at the discretion of the City of Lambertville.

**SECTION 6.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 7.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

INTRODUCED: August 20, 2013

PUBLIC HEARING: September 17, 2013 FINAL ADOPTION: October 16, 2013

Mayor DelVecchio opened the public hearing on Ordinance Number 19-2013 and he asked for comments and questions from the public. Mayor DelVecchio added that the SHREC is under no obligation to accept the bids.

There being no questions from the public, Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to close the public hearing on Ordinance Number 19-2013. Councilman Sanders made a motion to close the public hearing on Ordinance Number 19-2013. Councilwoman Asaro seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to adopt Ordinance Number 19-2013 on second reading and final approval. Councilwoman Warner made a motion to adopt Ordinance number 19-2013 on second reading and final approval. Council President Stegman seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

Ordinance Number 20-2013: A Bond Ordinance to Amend Ordinance Number 23-2011, Adding \$10,000 to Fund the Review of the Grant Application for Swan Creek Flood Gates.

Mayor DelVecchio read Ordinance Number 20-2013 into the record by title. He informed the members of the public present that this Ordinance is to add \$10,000 to the Flood Mitigation Fund to support the review of the grant application for Swan Creek Flood Gates.

#### **ORDINANCE NUMBER 20-2013**

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING A SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION OF \$10,000 FOR FUNDING OF THE BACK FLOODING FEASIBILITY STUDY IN AND BY THE CITY OF LAMBERTVILLE, IN THE COUNTY OF HUNTERDON, NEW JERSEY AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$9,500 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE CITY FOR FINANCING PART OF THE APPROPRIATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL, OF THE CITY OF LAMBERTVILLE, IN THE COUNTY OF HUNTERDON, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The improvement described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance has heretofore been authorized to be undertaken by the City of Lambertville, New Jersey as a general improvement. For the improvement or purpose described in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the supplemental amount of \$10,000, such sum being in addition to the \$9,590 appropriated therefore by bond ordinance #2009-14 of

the City finally adopted September 19, 2011 (Bond Ordinance 2011-23); the \$50,000 appropriated therefore by bond ordinance #2009-14 of the City finally adopted August 17, 2009 (Bond Ordinance 2009-14); the \$100,000 appropriated therefore by bond ordinance #2008-04 of the City finally adopted March 17, 2008 ("Bond Ordinance #2008-04"); the \$100,000 appropriated by bond ordinance #2007-16 of the City finally adopted April 16, 2007 ("Bond Ordinance 2007-16); and the \$40,000 appropriated therefore by bond ordinance #2007-01 of the City finally adopted January 16, 2007 ("Bond Ordinance #2007-01"), and including the sum of \$500 as the additional down payment required by the Local Bond Law. The additional down payment is now available by virtue of provision for down payment or for capital improvement purposes in one or more previously adopted budgets.

Section 2. In order to finance the additional cost of the improvement or purpose not covered by application of the additional down payment, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$9,500 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

- Section 3. (a) The improvement heretofore authorized and the purpose for the financing of which the bonds are to be issued is the funding of the Back Flooding Feasibility Study, including the project design, funding analysis and grant identification, for the construction of flood mitigation measures for the Ely Creek Region, a portion of the Alexauken Creek Region and Swan Creek as described in the bond ordinances #2007-1; #2007-16; #2008-04, #2009-14, and 2011-23, all as shown on and in accordance with the proposal on file in the office of the Clerk, which proposal is hereby approved.
- (b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for the improvement or purpose is \$294,110, including the \$9,110 bonds or notes authorized under bond Ordinance #2011-23, the \$47,500 bonds or notes authorized under Bond Ordinance #2009-14, the \$38,000 bonds or notes authorized by Bond Ordinance #2007-01, the \$95,000 bonds or notes authorized by Bond Ordinance #2007-16, the \$95,000 bonds or notes authorized by Bond Ordinance #2008-04 and the \$9,500 bonds or notes authorized herein.
- (c) The estimated cost of the improvement or purpose is \$309,590, including the 9,590 appropriated under Bond Ordinance #2011-23, the \$50,000 appropriated under Bond Ordinance #2009-14; the \$40,000 appropriated by Bond Ordinance #2007-01, the \$100,000 appropriated by Bond Ordinance #2007-16, the \$100,000 by Bond Ordinance #2008-04, and the \$10,000 appropriated herein.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer; provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of the Local Bond Law. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

Section 5. The City hereby certifies that it has adopted a capital budget or a temporary capital budget, as applicable. The capital or temporary capital budget of the City is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. To the extent that the purposes authorized herein are inconsistent with the adopted capital or temporary capital budget, a revised capital or temporary capital budget has been filed with the Division of Local Government Services.

Section 6. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

- (a) The improvement or purpose described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance is not a current expense. It is an improvement or purpose that the City may lawfully undertake as a general improvement, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.
- (b) The period of usefulness of the improvement or purpose within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 15 years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the City as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$9,500, and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$309,590 for items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for the purpose or improvement. Of this amount, \$9,590 was estimated for these items of expense in Bond Ordinance #2011-23, \$50,000 was estimated for these items of expense in Bond Ordinance #2009-14; \$40,000 was estimated for these items of expense in Bond Ordinance #2007-01; \$100,000 was estimated for these items of expense in Bond Ordinance 2008-04, and an additional \$10,000 is estimated therefore herein.

Section 7. The City hereby declares the intent of the City to issue the bonds or bond anticipation notes in the amount authorized in Section 2 of this bond ordinance and to use proceeds to pay or reimburse expenditures for the costs of the purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance. This Section 7 is a declaration of intent within the meaning and for purposes of Treasury Regulations §1.150-2 or any successor provisions of federal income tax law.

Section 8. Any grant moneys received for the purpose described in Section 3 hereof shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvement or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are so used.

Section 9. The chief financial officer of the City is hereby authorized to prepare and to update from time to time as necessary a financial disclosure document to be distributed in connection with the sale of obligations of the City and to execute such disclosure document on behalf of the City. The chief financial officer is further authorized to enter into the appropriate undertaking to provide secondary market disclosure on behalf of the City pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "Rule") for the benefit of holders and beneficial owners of obligations of the City and to amend such undertaking from time to time in connection with any change in law, or interpretation thereof, provided such undertaking is and continues to be, in the opinion of a nationally recognized bond counsel, consistent with the requirements of the Rule. In the event that the City fails to comply with its undertaking, the City shall not be liable for any monetary damages, and the remedy shall be limited to specific performance of the undertaking.

Section 10. The full faith and credit of the City are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the City, and the City shall be obligated to levy *ad valorem* taxes upon all the taxable real property within the City for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 11. This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

Mayor DelVecchio opened the public hearing on Ordinance 20-2013 and asked for any public comment or questions regarding this ordinance. Caren Franzini of South Union Street was present to thank the Mayor and Council for employing Jeff Ward to review the grant application.

She added that when it floods, it impacts Union Street, Swan Street and Ferry Street residents. In the past nine years, we have had five floods. She offered the support of her, her husband and neighbors and asked if letters would be helpful.

Mayor DelVecchio responded that there were two directions or paths to take. The first would have been with the residents in seeking flood mitigation projects. A quick review found that most mitigation projects, like raising homes, would have been difficult and complicated. We chose the global project which we've studied and while it won't help with a 100 year flood, it will help resolve most other flooding events from the river. He informed the members of the public present that the New Jersey Water Authority is going to begin working on the aqueduct at Swan Creek which will also provide some relief. The announcement was posted to the City's website at <a href="www.lambertvillenj.org">www.lambertvillenj.org</a>. Caren Franzini said that it would be great to have Mike Foley of FEMA in to speak with the neighborhood. Mayor DelVecchio commented that it is important to have the bank stabilized by Lilly's. Residents of the southern part of town volunteered to help write letters. The Mayor asked the Clerk to reach out to Jeff Ward to see what the community could do to be helpful. He reviewed the history of the project with the members of the public, stating that the grant was rejected twice by FEMA. He said they could have said they had other priorities but instead, they met with the City and offered some input on changes and said to apply again. The State ranks the grant applications for FEMA.

There being no further comments, Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to close the public hearing on Ordinance 20-2013. Councilman Sanders made a motion to close the public hearing. Councilwoman Asaro seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to adopt on second reading and final approval, Ordinance Number 20-2013. Councilwoman Warner made a motion to adopt Ordinance Number 20-2013 on second reading and final approval. Councilwoman Asaro seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

Ordinance Number 21-2013: A Special Emergency to Fund the Codification of the City's Ordinances, totaling \$18,050 to be paid over a five year period.

Mayor DelVecchio read Ordinance Number 21-2013 into the record by title and he informed the members of the public present that this ordinance will fund the codification of the City's General Ordinances and the Land Use Ordinances through a special emergency which will be funded and paid back through the budget over the next five years.

### City of Lambertville ORDINANCE NUMBER 21-2013

Special Emergency to Codify the Ordinances of the City of Lambertville WHEREAS, it has been found necessary to make an emergency appropriation to meet certain extraordinary expenses incurred, or to be incurred, for the revision and codification of ordinances; and WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A-53, a municipality may adopt an ordinance authorizing a special emergency appropriations for the purpose of the revision and codification of ordinances and pursuant to

N.J.S.A. 40A:4-55, "special emergency notes" may be authorized and issued to finance the special emergency appropriation and the municipality shall provide for an appropriation of at least one-fifth of the amount of the special emergency appropriation in succeeding annual budgets;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Lambertville, in the County of Hunterdon, in the State of New Jersey, not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring that in accordance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:4-55:

- 1. An emergency appropriation be and the same is hereby made for the codification of the City's ordinances in the amount of \$18,050.00.
- 2. That said emergency appropriation shall be provided for in full in the budgets of the next succeeding years by the inclusion of not less than \$3,610.00 in each of the next succeeding annual budgets.
- 3. That an "Emergency Note" not in excess of the above amount authorized pursuant to law be provided.
- 4. That such note shall be executed by the Chief Municipal Finance Officer of the City of Lambertville, the Mayor of the City of Lambertville and/or the City Clerk.
- 5. That said note shall be issued and dated as determined by the Chief Financial Officer, may be renewed from time to time and such note and any renewals thereof shall mature and be paid in the amount of not less than one-fifth of the total amount appropriated by this resolution in each year after the authorization thereof.

The capital budget is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of an inconsistency therewith and the resolutions promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services as on file with the Municipal Clerk and is available for public inspection. A certified copy of this resolution shall be submitted in duplicate to the Director, Division of Local Government Services.

York Street (Franklin Street to Route 179): the grant was submitted to NJDOT and we anticipate hearing back in the spring of 2014.

York Street (Clinton to Main Street) United Water Project: United Water's contractor is installing a new water main on York Street. They started on Monday, September 9<sup>th</sup> and hope to

be finished by October 14, 2013. Paving Project: The City Engineer is putting together a proposal to bid this project which includes streets on Cottage Hill: Studdiford, Lincoln, Boozer and the resurfacing of York Street. This will take place after Elizabethtown Gas installs the new gas line to fuel the generator at City Hall. Miscellaneous.

Swan Creek: the application was submitted to FEMA on September 6, 2013. The State has until Oct 17th to review all, develop a State wide application (with all sub-applications rolled up). The rumor is the State will submit their prioritized list to FEMA Region. Once the Region receives all State applications for States in the Region, they will review for Tech Feasibility, Completeness, BCA, and Environmental and will select those for award. This will then roll up to FEMA national who will concur with awards. Awards may be announced late this year or early next year.

SHREC: the Ordinance for the Community Aggregation Project was adopted tonight.

Garbage & Recycling: Mayor DelVecchio reported that the 2013 figures are 9.29% less than 2012 figures which are 64% more than 2011figures. The recycling tonnage for 2013 is up by 18% which is above 2011 numbers and he congratulated the Acting Public Works Director, 2011 numbers are .03% above 2012 recycling figures. The Mayor reported that the Acting Public Works Director and the Environmental Commission are working on a pilot program to recycle Food Waste.

LMUA Update on Odor Concerns: Mayor DelVecchio stated that there was a press release in the Beacon and an update in the membership packets.

John Anderson of Jersey Central Power & Light was present and Mayor DelVecchio asked him to speak about the West Amwell Project. Mr. Anderson informed the members of the public present that JCP&L was looking into expanding the Rocktown Road substation to a 230,000 line. It is currently a 34,500 line. This would allow them to back feed when the south county suffers a power outage and help with resolving the large power outage.

Mr. Anderson spoke about JCP&L's Critical Facilities survey which has been circulated to all municipalities. This will make this information available to them and allow them to focus on the areas of importance during a storm without conversing with each municipality.

Mayor DelVecchio left the meeting at 8:00 pm to celebrate his son's birthday.

#### BEST PRACTICE INVENTORY:

Council President Stegman asked the City Clerk to report on the Best Practice Inventory. The City Clerk informed the members of the public present that the Best Practice Inventory is created by the State of New Jersey Division of Community Affairs and is required to be completed and submitted on an annual basis. The Inventory encourages municipalities to embrace practices that promote financial accountability and transparency in government. She informed the members of Council that a full copy was in their packet and the members of the public present that copies were available on the desk. The Clerk reported that the Best Practice Inventory was prepared with the City's CMFO, who certified the report. Each question is given a point value and they are tallied. If a municipality falls below 41 points, they will not receive the final 5% of their State Aid in 2013. The City scored 47 points.

#### ADJOURNMENT.

The meeting adjourned at 8:24 p.m. with a motion made by Councilman Sanders and seconded by Councilwoman Warner. An affirmative voice vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.
