Mayor DelVecchio read the Ordinance by title into the record. He informed the members of the public that the public hearing for Ordinance Number 26-2017 was continued from the October 17, 2017's regularly scheduled session of the Governing Body.

a. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays (New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and the day after Thanksgiving, and Christmas), from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Mayor DelVecchio opened the public hearing for Ordinance Number 26-2017 and asked the City Clerk if Mr. Rago provided the requested notice to the neighbors. The City Clerk confirmed and stated that the packet was provided to the City Attorney on Friday, November 17, 2017.

Mayor DelVecchio opened the public hearing on Ordinance Number 26-2017 and asked for questions or comments from the public.

Arlene Wagner of 187 George Street addressed the governing body. Ms. Wagner stated that she has lived on George Street since 1995 and the building was previously occupied by Tillett Plumbing with no issues with blocking the street. They pulled their truck into the driveway. She asked why they need to have a loading zone?

Mike Ingham, the COO of Rago's responded that they purchased the building from Ron Tillett and the trucks used by Tillett Plumbing were smaller than what is used by Rago's. He added that if they could use the driveway they would but the radius prohibits the 16 foot truck from maneuvering in and out of the driveway. The business moves (lots of stuff) approximately 13,000 lots per year.

Ms. Wagner commented that it is a great inconvenience especially because George Street is a one way street. She asked why they didn't rent smaller trucks/vans.

Mayor DelVecchio asked if the parking issue is just during the day. Councilwoman Warner, who resides at 34 Elm Street, commented that she had no horse in this race because she has a driveway, however, the street is often blocked and parking is an issue in the neighborhood. Mayor DelVecchio asked if a shorter time frame would work for the neighborhood. Mr. Ingham commented that they accept deliveries Monday through Friday from 9 am to 5:30 pm, except during lunch. He stated that as a property tax payer, he feels that his property expands across two parking spaces and the Wagner's have spaces on Elm Street.

Council President Stegman commented that he has heard rumors about they are acquiring another building and asked if they could use the building to help alleviate the parking issue. Mr. Ingham commented that the other building is being purchased for additional space and it isn't big enough to use for this purpose.

Mayor DelVecchio asked if a shorter time period was approved if they could schedule their deliveries. Ms. Wagner asked where the loading zone was going to be placed. Mayor DelVecchio responded that they were the first two spaces on George Street closest to Elm Street. Ms. Wagner expressed concern that the employees of Rago would use the loading zone as a parking space. The Police Director commented that the loading zone would limit parking for fifteen minutes and they would not be allowed to park a vehicle all day in that space. Ms. Wagner asked why they had to be used as a loading zone during holidays and what holidays it would be enforced on.

Meagan Warner of 34 Elm Street commented that she lives by Rago's and feels that the loading zone is a good idea but the time needs to be shortened. Most families have young children and shouldn't have to park around the block. Rago can work within a designated time of delivery. Three or four hours a day is more than reasonable, excluding holidays. A designated time in the afternoon is more than reasonable. Mr. Ingham commented that they don't need the loading zone during holidays; this is a warehouse integral to business not just a matter of customers. We empty the building for previews into the warehouse. Mayor DelVecchio suggested from 10 am to 3 pm for a time limit on the loading zone. Mr. Ingham commented that the end of day is the bigger issue.

Council President Stegman asked if the deliveries are centered on auctions. Mr. Ingham said they are to some extent but stuff is constantly in motion. Ultimately it ends up at the George Street warehouse. Mayor DelVecchio commented that he understand their position but reminded them they are in a residential district. Mr. Ingham commented that the reason they are here is because they were blocking the street and it was a problem.

Councilman Sanders suggested that we modify the ordinance to remove holidays, 9:30 am as the start time and 4:30 pm as the end time. He said "let's try to accommodate the needs of the residents and the business.

Ms. Wagner asked if there were certain days of the week that were busier. Mr. Ingham stated that it depends on the week. The period immediately following an auction is busy but it can be any day of the week. Mr. Wagner commented that the other point is our block has two existing handicapped parking spaces and adding this loading zone would mean the residents would have

two less available parking spaces on this block and it is a short block. This makes four spaces that are not available to the residents to use. Mr. Ingham commented that he parks on George Street during the day and rarely has a problem finding parking.

Mr. Wagner asked to define the holidays. Discussion ensued. Mrs. Wagner asked about snow emergencies. If there is a blizzard and you come out the next day and it's a Wednesday do we need to shovel out to free up the loading zone? Mayor DelVecchio commented that once the streets are cleared then you need to legally park.

Meagan Warner asked what if they continue to block the street outside of delivery hours. Council President Stegman said they should call the police and let them handle it.

Discussion ensued about the holidays. Mr. Ingham commented that they are closed for major holidays.

Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to close the public hearing for Ordinance Number 26-2017. Councilman Sanders made a motion to close the public hearing and Council President Stegman seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

Mayor DelVecchio asked for a motion to adopt Ordinance Number 26-2017 on second reading, granting final approval. Council President made a motion to adopt Ordinance Number 26-2017 on second reading, granting final approval of the loading zone Monday through Friday, 9:30 am to 4:30 pm, excluding the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Labor Day, Independence Day, Thanksgiving, the day after Thanksgiving and Christmas. Councilman Sanders seconded the motion. An affirmative roll call vote was taken by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

UNFINISHED/OLD BUSINESS

Mayor DelVecchio reviewed the list of completed projects and projects in process with the members of the public.

Completed Projects Review: 2017 Budget, Upper York Street Construction Project, North Union Street Park – Phase I, Ely Field ADA Compliance & New Bleachers, Third Can Recycling Program (65 – 70% savings and we are helping the environment), new website is up and operating. It is more user friendly, transparent, prettier too! Council President Stegman thanked everyone, including John Flanagan and stated he was the least expensive, and has been patient, knowledgeable, and the city is happy with the result.

Projects in Process

Public Works Fence/Gate: Mayor DelVecchio asked the Public Works Director if he was going to make the December 1st deadline. The Public Works Director commented that he hoped to.

D&R Canal Parking – at the beginning of February, we will reach out to DEP to reengage them.

Swan Creek Flood/LMUA Force Main Mitigation Project: the City is waiting until the new administration has been installed to take further action.

Videotaping Meetings: Comcast will install their equipment on December 20th. We are hoping to have everything in place for a test run of the December 27th session.

COAH Law Suit: the Special Master is dealing with the landowner. Then she will do the presentation to fair share.

CRS Update: The City went from a level 10 to a level 7. The Committee will meet on 11/30/17.

PennEast Pipeline: there is a meeting in December. They are waiting on the new administration.

Clinton Street Phase I: beginning at Delaware Avenue and ending at York Street. The bid date is 02/0/2018.

Clinton Street Phase II: beginning at Buttonwood Street and ending at Delaware Avenue. There will be a public meeting on January 10th with the residents to review the plans.

LED Street Lights: the LED Street Lights will be installed on Bridge Street on December 6th. They will install the first 11 of 93 lights. Then the City will hold a public meeting with the property owners of the next phases.

Community Aggregation: the City bid this but the numbers were not beneficial. JCP&L will get numbers for the next couple of years the end of January. The City will consult with our professionals after that to see where we are. Time will lapse and the bills will go back to JCP&L until the project is re-bid and awarded. The City Clerk was asked to get something to the Communications Director.

Mr. Gary W. White of Mountainside, New Jersey was present to ask the Governing Body to adopt a proclamation to help raise awareness for Fibro dysplasia Ossificans Progressiva { FOP }, a rare genetic condition in which the body makes additional bone in locations where bone should not form, such as within muscles, tendons, ligaments, and other connective tissues, which in time produces a 'second skeleton' that immobilizes the joints of the body. There are two bills supported by Senator Shirley Turner (SJR 98) and Assemblyman Jack M. Ciattarelli

(ARJ147) with April 23, 2018 as the first awareness day. Mr. White was asked to check with the City Clerk to see if it is on the December 19, 2017 meeting agenda.
